Possible treatment consequences and/or late effects:

Acute Effects (During or shortly after radiotherapy)

- Pain in the affected area this often becomes worse 24 48 hours post treatment due to an inflammatory response in the tissues being treated. Regular analgesia is advised. When effective most patients get relief of their pain within 2 4 weeks, but it is important to continue taking analgesia until pain settles
- Skin irritation Skin in the treatment area may become pink (erythematous) following completion of treatment. Moisturising cream to be applied twice daily. Pruritus 1% Hydrocortisone topical application twice daily (for up to a week). Discontinue use of creams if skin becomes broken
- Fatigue moderate daily exercise within the limits of mobility should be encouraged. Avoid any exercise which is high impact e.g. running or exercise which might cause a fall

Other side effects depend on the area which has been treated

- Thoracic or lumbar spine nausea and vomiting. Anti-emetics may be helpful
- Pelvis diarrhoea. Loperamide can be used
- Cervical spine soreness and discomfort with swallowing. Soluble analgesics can be helpful
